5.1 Societal Expectations and Norms

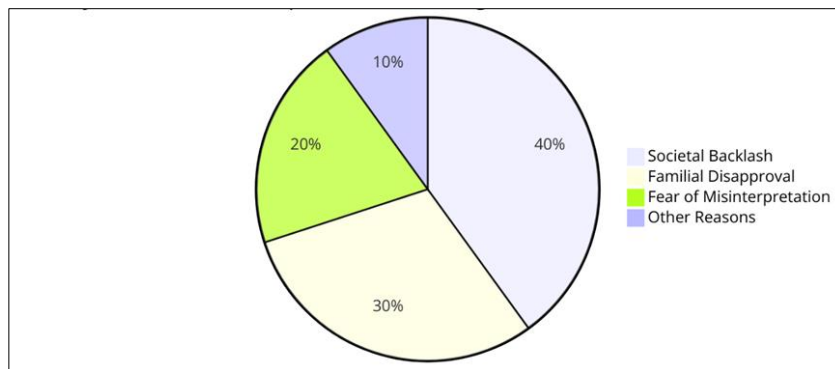
